LKRA executive has been participating in meetings of the newly-formed HBM Conference of Lake Associations, headed by Ruth Pezzack, of Jack's Lake.
Belmont, Cordova, Jack's, Kasshabog, Methuen, Oak and Round Lakes have all been represented. I'd like to personally thank Jim Brickell, Secretary, LKRA, Rick Rye, VP, LKRA, and Terry Rees, Executive Director, FOCA, for their participation and input. It has been invaluable.

The intention of the association is to inform the HBM Council of our dissatisfaction with the current state of communication with the council. We feel that we have not been part of the public input process even though lakeside property owners represent close to 70% of both the voting population and the tax base. We have asked to be informed of council meeting agendas at least 10 days in advance of those meetings so that members of the HBM Conference of Lake Associations have the opportunity to attend. As well, we have asked that minutes of those meetings be posted on the HBM website, along with the current Official Plan. With a Municipal Elections year upcoming, the Conference is organizing an all-candidates meeting where each candidate can be asked the same pre-set

questions that impact lakefront property owners. Information and communication are vital if we are to have any influence in matters that so affect all of us. Any of you who would like to be involved in this, or in any other of the LKRA committees, please don't hesitate to contact the LKRA. It is up to all of us to be involved if meaningful change is to happen. Help is always welcomed, and always appreciated.



































Facts about the Dam Fund by Lelia MacDonald

The dam was built in the 1940s by the Ministry of Natural Resources. The Crow Valley Conservation Authority is responsible for managing the water level by changing the logs. The ground on which the dam sits is owned by the two neighbours.

The Fund was created in the 1990s by the LKRA to assist the Ministry with future costs. Lakes which can contribute funds might be placed higher on the Ministry's replacement list. The fund currently has a balance of \$13,500.

The Ministry inspects all lake dams occasionally. The results from Kasshabog Lake's most recent testing is that the dam (both the cement and the logs) is still structurally sound.



HAVELOCK BELMONT METHUEN NEWS

To the Lake Kasshabog Resident's Association Members

Once again we are entering another summer season, and it was an exceptional winter weather wise, however time seems to be flying by us.

This year is another election year and you should note that the election itself will be on October 25th, 2010, for another 4 year term. We will be utilizing vote by mail again as we have for the past four (4) elections. The new Council will not commence their term until the first meeting in December which will be December 7th, 2010. As rural residents of the Township, you do not get to vote for the Village Ward Council Member.

Council is again in the budget process and we are very aware that the decisions made by Council will affect all of us dollar wise, however, we continue to have to deal with downloaded issues that have a huge impact on the budget, but that we as the Township has little control. We do want to let you know, that we are very aware as we deliberate the budget, of the implications to all taxpayers.

The process of updating our Official Plan and the zoning by-law has taken longer than anticipated, as we had to wait on the County and the Province with respect to Places to Grow legislation. The figures are now in, but we are faced with a municipal election and Council will have to determine how far we proceed with the update to the Official Plan. We may be just addressing the places to grow legislation, to allow both Council and the public to have more time to address any concerns. Unfortunately, the new Council will be dealing with the updates to the Township Zoning By-law.

The Ethanol Plant we are hoping will be up and running by the first of April, however, approvals have held them up somewhat. We do know they are as eager as we are to the see the project come to fruition.

The Waste Water Treatment Plant is up and running and we will work with it to determine when we can start taking septage from the Township ward. We have to do a gradual feed due to the strength of the septage. This we feel will definitely benefit the Township, however will be more costly than the lagoon system.

The Township has been doing their part for the CT Scan fund raiser for the Campbellford Hospital and must give a lot of credit to the committee as establish to develop events and the collect ion of funds. We have achieved over \$200,000. of the proposed \$400,000. which is a great achievement for a small community.

On behalf of Council we welcome you back to your home away from home and hope your summer weather is as good as our winter weather has been.

Turtles – from the Road to Recovery – with your help!

One of the most attractive features of Kasshabog Lake and its surrounding area is the prevalence of marshes and wetlands. These bogs attract and are home to a diverse array of wildlife, providing am-



ple opportunities for excellent animal and bird watching. We've all enjoyed watching a hungry heron or wary weasel along our shorelines.

However, as we rush to the cottage to commune with nature, we are severely threatening some inhabitants of that natural world. At least one species of local wildlife is being decimated on our local roads and highways.

Many people don't realize that seven of Ontario's eight species of turtle have been identified as being at risk. Others are surprised to hear that the Snapping Turtle was added last year as a species of special concern. As cottagers in a region that is home to several of Ontario's turtle species, we can all help this ancient animal.

There is no question that roads are one of the most serious threats to turtles. Many of the turtles that are injured or killed on our roadways are females on their way to nest. Having taken many years to reach reproductive maturity, the killing of a pregnant female takes a toll on the population for years to come. While a turtle will never run out in front of your car, they require a different kind of vigilance to help them avoid being hit.

Please take special care in watching out for turtles on area roads. If you see what looks like a large rock on the road, or the sun glinting off a possible shell, slow down and try to avoid it. In addition to steering around them, you can help even more by helping them off the road. Here are some tips to ensure that both you and the turtle make it safely across.

- * Make sure it is safe for you to pull over and help the turtle in need.
- If you are helping an uninjured turtle off the road, always be sure to move the animal in the direction it is headed – even if that is away from the nearest water. Depending on the season, it may be on its way to a nesting or hibernation area.
- * Species such as painted turtles or Blandings turtles can be picked up by the shell and placed out of harm's way.
- * A snapping turtle can be coaxed across the road using a shovel or board or by allowing it to bite a long stick and pulling it across. A small snapper can be picked up holding the shell at the back, on each side of the tail. You can also slide one hand under the belly shell. Be careful as it may squirm vigourously!
- Never pick up a turtle by its tail; you could damage its spine.
- * If you have handled a turtle, wash your hands thoroughly.

If you find a turtle that has been injured, consider bringing it to a rehabilitation centre. We Kosh Lakers are lucky to be in the vicinity of the Kawartha Turtle Trauma Centre located in nearby Peterborough. It is a place where turtles that have been injured can be taken for treatment, and eventually released back into the wild. Friendship Found at Garage Sale

A book about Kasshabog was born in 2003 when I met Marina Puffer-Butland at her garage sale. I was looking for a pull out couch and found a lifelong friend. While our husbands loaded my purchases into the van, Marina and I instantly formed a friendship and a common interest in writing local history. That was the beginning of a thirty month odyssey – a quest that gathered memories, creativity and photographs between the pages of Docks of the Bays. With the financial and emotional support of our husbands and the design skills of Janine and Stuart Ellis we continue to be proud of our labours. When I thought about the birth of Docks of the Bays and my garage sale-ing days I was prompted to write this column:

I saw the first true sign of spring this week. GARAGE SALE! Forget the robins and crocus. Spring does not arrive until that first hand made sign appears. I take garage sale-ing seriously. So seriously that my friends and family don't visit on weekends now. One son, who insisted on getting married in garage sale season, still complains they had to have the ceremony mid week. I told him to look at the bright side; they didn't have any problem getting a hall, and we saved money with so few guests.

Garage/yard sales are an over looked major socio-economic contribution and should be part of school curriculum in my view. Since they're not, I am correcting the oversight with my quintessential guidebook. *Curbside Commando.*

It covers research, analysis and preparation. Equipment consists of the local paper and a map. Graph the sale area carefully to get to the most in the least time. My personal best is currently 87 sales but I am aiming for Gold. One hundred Yards before noon should do it. And don't drink any beverages unless you calculate pit stop time. There are many factors that slow sale-ing but that's in my second book, *Saturday Survivor*.

There are clues buried in the advertisement that will help you narrow the list.

Moving South for instance is of huge significance. Here lies an array of snow tires; toboggans; shovels; space heaters; skis and winter clothes.

Downsizing rates 9.5 on my chart. They are usually moving into an apartment and picnic benches; lawnmowers; power saws; hedge pruners are sprinkled among the linen, furniture and cutlery treasures.

Leaving the country is a dream on the lawn. I barely sleep the night before this one. **No early birds** and the street will be plugged by day break, with the cops and CNN there by 7:30 a.m.

Garage salers fall into categories and here's an excerpt from book three.

Starsky and Hutch: The vehicle screeches to a stop, left wheel to the curb and a couple leap out – doors left open. They scope the tables and lawn in seconds. Make the purchase and vanish. I ache to have their skills.

Browsers: They have coffee in hand, two or three friends and an adorable puppy with them.

They are the connoisseurs of garage sales and take the time to expound on the beauty and functionality of each item. Vendors take note, they don't buy.

With thirty years experience I have some cautions for newbies.

Do not take children with you. They can afford this stuff and if they whine or beg for something you don't want at any price, the seller gives it to them free. That's the reason I have a corner in the basement filled with unfinished jig saw puzzles with missing pieces; a one eyed doll; a talking goat that doesn't; a Hardy Boy Mystery with the last page ripped out so the story still remains a mystery; a Sesame Street record that skips; and a wondrous array of unidentifiable objects that cost pennies and couldn't be resisted.

Storage is a problem I have yet to solve. On Monday, I was making my way to the washing machine. I say "making my way" because my garage sale treasures have overtaken the walking space. I had a flash of guilt when I wondered why I needed seventeen irons when most of my wash is permanent press. Four fireplace screens and we don't have a fireplace. Seven manual typewriters; 73 hand knitted afghans; twelve rolls of mismatched wallpaper and seven boxes of National Geographic. Remorse passed quickly when I realized it was only five days and seventeen hours until Saturday and the arrival of spring.

Ontario Municipal Elections 2010

To address the lack of a voice of cottagers had at the local level of government, several years ago FOCA undertook the job of reforming the way local elections took place in Ontario. Municipal Councils are now able to pass bylaws empowering their Clerks to utilize alternate means to vote, including the vote by mail option. Note that the HBM Council passed a bylaw to conduct the municipal election using the vote by mail option their March 2, 2010 meeting. This means that if you are the voters' list, you will be able to vote for your local municipal representatives by mail-in ballot this Fall.

This summer, your association has a role to play in deciding how your local tax dollars are spent, and what local priorities get addressed over the next term of office. Note that the term for your local council is 4 years, so getting informed and organized is very important.

Get out there and vote!

The summer is an important time for residents to get to know the candidates running for municipal council this fall. Municipal government is your local connection to public services, and are the source of many important parts of your experience on the waterfront, including the establishment of an Official Plan for your area, creating and enforcing municipal bylaws, waste management, public roads, municipal fire fighting, parks and recreation, drinking water and wastewater, ambulance, police, and library services. Your municipality ultimately manages the municipal budget, which is paid for through your property taxes.

Changes to the Municipal Elections Act

Bill 212 received Royal Assent on December 15, 2009, and included several revisions to the Elections Act, including setting out the dates for nominations as a candidate (now January 4, 2010, until 2pm September 10, 2010), and the Election Day (October 25, 2010).

On May 18, 2006 Bill 81, the Budget Measures Act, 2006, received Royal Assent. It included an amendment to the Municipal Elections Act, establishing a four-year (changed from three years) term of office for council members and school trustees. Four-year terms first began with the new councils effective December 1, 2006, so getting informed about the issues and the perspectives of the candidates in your area and making wise choices during the election are crucial.

MPAC will provide every municipal clerk with a list of eligible voters. The clerk is required to provide notice of the location of voting places, dates and times when voting places will be open, where voting proxies are available and how electors may use voting proxies, and (where alternative voting has been authorized by municipal bylaw), exactly how the alternate voting will take place.

Key Dates:

- January 4th, 2010 Nomination and Campaign Period Commences
- June 1st, 2010 Deadline to pass by-law authorizing an alternative voting method
- July 31st, 2010 Earliest date to receive Preliminary List of Electors
- September 7th, 2010 Revision of Preliminary List of Electors begins
- September 10, 2010 Nominations close (2 pm)
- Week of September 27th, 2010 Voter Kits will be mailed out
- October 16th, 2010 Last day for returning ballot by mail
- October 25th, 2010 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. VOTING DAY
- October 26th, 2010 Clerk to Declare Official Results



December 1st, 2010 to November 30th, 2014 (four year term)







Fire Pump Instructions

In each of the pump houses located strategically around the lake there should be a pump, intake hose with a foot-valve, fire hose, small can of gasoline, a plastic container for priming, hand bell and a copy of these instructions. At each of the marinas, 2 additional 50 ft. lengths of hose are kept for use when needed.

- 1. En route to the fire, call for help by ringing the bell. Take along these instructions.
- 2. See that there is oil in the crankcase and gasoline in the tank of the pump engine (either clear or mixed gas as for outboards)
- 3. Set intake pipe in water with foot valve as nearly vertical as possible. Fill the pipe with water (foot valve prevents water from running out) and attach to pump, avoid damaging the foot valve screen.
- 4. Prime the pump by tilting it and pouring water into the output opening, fill to overflowing and then attach fire hose

CAUTION: Do not run without water in pump or oil (SAE 30) in crankcase.

Starting: ~~ Old Pumps ~~

- A. Pull Choke Control
- B. Push Stop Switch away from the spark plug
- C. Use Pull Cord
- D. When Motor starts Push in Choke Control

<u>To Stop</u>: Push Stop Switch against the end of the spark plug.

Starting: ~~ New Pumps ~~

- A. Turn Ignition Switch to ON
- B. Move Gas Lever to ON
- C. Move Choke Lever to ON
- D. Use pull cord
- E. Turn choke off when motor starts
- F. Move throttle to FAST

<u>To Stop:</u> Turn ignition switch to OFF

- <u>AFTER USING</u>: 1. Clean and dry suction pipe and hose before replacing in the pump house.
 - 2. Report the use of the pump to any member of the Executive.

Note that the Lake Kasshabog Residents' Association is not responsible for ensuring pumps have gas and are operational. If you use a pump please leave it in good working order.



CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF HAVELOCK-BELMONT-METHUEN Fire Regulations

NOTE: An Open Air Burning By-Law is in place in the Township which is applicable January to December of each year.

- All open air burning must be done in compliance with the Forest Fire Prevention Act.
- All open air burning done during daytime hours, being 2 hours after sunrise and up to 2 hours before sunset will require a permit, to be issued by the Fire Chief or his designate.


Any person setting, maintaining or allowing to burn, a fire and all property owners upon which a fire is set, maintained or allowed to burn in open air:

- shall, be responsible for any damage to property occasioned by said fire
- shall, if the fire is not permitted pursuant to the by-law or does not otherwise comply with the regulations set out herein, be liable for the payment of a fee comprised of the cost of any fire fighting equipment and personnel.

FireSmart

The Federation of Ontario Cottagers' Associations (FOCA) is a not for profit association of community groups from across the province, established in 1963 to speak for and to waterfront property owners and their local community groups. FOCA's 550 member associations represent almost 50,000 rural and waterfront property owners. Waterfront property owners together own more than 200,000 acres of forested lands, and are key stakeholders in fire safe living.

Ontario's cottage and camp owners are by sheer geography, a self-help group. As rural and often remote residents, they need to be independent when it comes not only to day to day living, but also to be prepared and able to respond in times of crisis and emergency.

FireSmart is an important complement to other FOCA programs such as the Cottage Watch Rural crime prevention partnership and safe boating initiatives with OPP, and fits nicely with our commitment to risk management for our volunteer community groups.

Forest fires are a fact of life in Ontario, and our members are among those who are potentially at risk from the threat of fire. The FireSmart approach to rural and woodland living helps each property owner to understand their risks, and to take proactive steps to make their families and their property safer.

Our member associations are often the only organized voice for their respective communities. By tapping into their trusted connection with property owners, the important message around reducing the risks from fire and also being prepared in the event of fire – are delivered, understood and can be acted on by property owners all across Ontario.

FOCA is spreading the information about FireSmart Cottages fact sheets at our special events, speaking engagements, and trade shows such as the Toronto and Ottawa Cottage Shows. FOCA has distributed FireSmart information through our member publications, on the FOCA website (www.foca.on.ca), and through presentations at our member events each spring and fall. FOCA, along with the Northern Ontario Tourist Operators (NOTO), are working with MNR to embed the important Firesmart messages with each property owner in forested Ontario. By taking simple steps on our respective properties we can protect ourselves, and others.

Every homeowner can do something, and at different times of the year they have different opportunities to make a difference. FOCA encourages landowners to plan ahead to protect their homes from the risk of forest fires and follow safe burning guidelines for brush and campfires.

Waterfront property owners can FireSmart their home with this seasonal checklist:

Spring

- * Do a home assessment prior to spring fire season to help you prepare for the threat of wildfire
- * Clean dead vegetation out of shrubs and other foundation plantings
- * Connect your garden hose to an outdoor spigot and attach a nozzle. Make sure other firefighting tools like shovels, rakes and buckets are handy
- Move firewood and lumber piles to at least 10 metres away from your buildings

Summer

- Clean gutters and remove and flammable debris from roof.
- Keep grass and brush cut around propane tanks and buildings. This provides a green barrier that fire will not burn
- * Keep the area within 10 metres of buildings relatively clear of combustible materials
- * Enclose soffits and areas under decks. Replace flammable roofing, siding, and foundation enclosures with more fire resistant materials
- * Post road signs or house number in reflective materials so they can be clearly seen in the dark

Fall

- Prune trees after leaves fall. Pruning branches up to 3 meters above the ground, to help prevent fire from climbing branches into tree crowns
- * Prune branches that are overhanging roof and wires
- * Make sure your home is fire safe on the inside. Check chimneys, smoke alarms, and fire extinguishers

Winter

- * Plan the activities you want to do this year to make your property safe and encourage others to do the same
- * Check your fire insurance annually to make sure it is adequate to cover a fire loss

Safe Burning

- * Check with your municipality before you burn leaves and debris. You may be required to get a permit, there may be a restricted fire zone (RFZ) in effect, or you may be only allowed to burn at certain times in the day
- * Choose a safe day. Burn during the coolest, calmest, dampest time of day. Do not burn when it is windy
- Never leave your fire unattended
- * A pile to be burnt must be no more than 2 metres in diameter and less than 2 metres in height

Safe Campfires

- * Use a fire pit for campfires. Dig a hole, ensure the area around the pit is free of combustible materials, surround your fire pit with rocks or stone slabs, and keep a bucket of water nearby
- * Make sure all glowing embers are extinguished before you leave your fire. In a fire pit, add water and stir into ashes. If water is not handy, mineral soil also works well to extinguish fire

FOCA encourages waterfront communities to discuss wildfire preparedness and create a community action plan, considering the following questions:

- * What will you do if a fire is approaching yours or a neighbour's residence?
- * Who will you call, and how do you sound an alarm to notify the community?
- * Does your community have fire equipment in strategic locations on the lake? Who is in charge of maintaining this equipment, and who has access to it?
- Are there emergency exits clearly marked in community buildings?
- * Do you have a home escape plan?
- * Have you located fire safe areas in the community such as lakes or other wet areas, rock outcrops, and roads?

Report a Wildfire

- * Be prepared to give fire officials the following information; a detailed description of the fire location, how fire-fighters can access the fire, types of buildings in the area, cutting operations or other activities in the area, and the time fire was discovered
- * Central and South Ontario call 911 or your local municipal fire department
- Northwestern Ontario call 1-888-284-FIRE
- * Northeastern Ontario- can 1-888-863-FIRE
